A painting to examine!





Hello. Are you ready for some monster mayhem? Are you ready to create your own monsters and think of where these wild things are... or are they wild?

The above painting is called 'Landscape With Aeneas at Delos'

If you click on the above link you will find the image. Above the image, click the word 'description' in the white bar and you can read some information about the characters at the front of the painting. We are told that the figure in white is a king who is pointing to an olive and palm tree. At the bottom of the image is a box with a small version of the image. On its base is a line with a negative sign at one end and a positive at the other. Clicking on these symbols will allow you to zoom in and out of the painting.

Imagine, the king is pointing to the tower on the left hand side of the painting and not the tree. Now, imagine that the ship which is next to the tower has been abandoned. Imagine, it was abandoned by a group of sailors who were in search of a legendary monster who lives in the tower. Imagine the conversation between the robed king and the figure in red. The figure in red wants to know all about the creature in the tower. Your task is to create the most wonderful, fabulous monster ever known to human kind. Let me give you some tips with ideas but we want you to come up with your own and write about the monster in as much detail as you can.

- Where did the monster come from? Did it fall from the sky? Did it evolve from dinosaurs or a stray meteor?
- What does he look like? Be original do not copy any monsters which already exist in myth.

- Why does it live in the tower? Was it abandoned? Does it keep any secrets and has to be confined so the secret does not come out?
- What does it eat? Sailors? Fresh air? Hidden jewels of the sea?
- Has it ever left the tower? Would it shatter the surrounding buildings if it did? Is it cursed?

Create a book, poster or interview all about your monster.

Now, try to draw a map using the painting and the map shown.

## Steps:

- Draw an outline, a squiggly outline with a harbour, peninsula and a delta (look these words up in a dictionary)
- Add rivers and their tributaries.
- Add trees, castles, towers, temples, ruins, and the site of a shipwreck
- Add a compass showing its eight points.
- What about a lighthouse?
- Can you add clear, neat labels of made up places?

Carefully colour the land and the see. Add layers of different colours or blend colours to show depth. Use a felt tip to outline the coast. A fine liner or felt tip will work well for any buildings, creatures or other features.

Where long ago the Elvons fought


